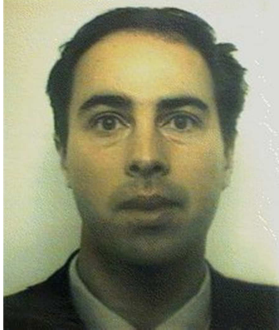

Lecturers

Prof. Dr. Dimitri Van Overbeke



Dimitri Vanoverbeke is professor of Japanese studies at the K.U. Leuven (Faculty of Arts) since 1998. He was trained at the graduate school of Tokyo University's law faculty (socio-legal studies) and was associate professor at Kyushu University (1995-1998). Recently, he has been awarded a guest professorship at Tokyo University's Social Science Institute. His research focuses on the development of the judiciary in modern Japan; Japan's legal capacity building in Asia and on the development of the rule of law in Japan and in the wider Asian region.

Prof. Dr. Jan Wouters



Jan Wouters (1964) is Professor of International Law and International Organizations, Jean Monnet Chair *Ad Personam* EU and Global Governance and Director of the Leuven Centre for Global Governance Studies and Institute for International Law at the University of Leuven (KULeuven). He is Visiting Professor at the College of Europe, President of the Flemish Foreign Affairs Council and *Of Counsel* at Linklaters. He is Member of the Royal Flemish Academy of Belgium for Sciences and Arts. He studied law and philosophy in Antwerp and Yale University (LLM 1990), was a Visiting Researcher at Harvard Law School and obtained his PhD at KULeuven (1996). He taught at the Universities of Antwerp and Maastricht, was Visiting Professor at Liège and Kyushu University and *Référéndaire* at the European Court of Justice (1991-1994). He is Editor of *International Encyclopedia of Intergovernmental Organizations* and Vice-Director of *Revue belge de droit international*. He has published widely (over 360 publications including 30 books and 70 international journal articles). Apart from his participation in many national and international research projects and networks, he often trains international and national officials, advises a number of international organizations and frequently comments international events in the media.

Prof. Dr. Hans Bruyninckx



Hans Bruyninckx is professor of International Relations at KU Leuven. His research emphasizes the influence of the various globalization processes on the global governance of environmental problems and sustainable development. Particular attention is paid to underlying theoretical and conceptual frameworks. The translation and testing of innovative and critical social theories (such as network and flows perspectives) to multi-level governance arrangements of global environmental and sustainable development issues are at the core of this team's research efforts. His recent research includes specific expertise for the role of China in environmental governance.

Prof. Dr. Filip De Beule



Filip de Beule is Assistant Professor of International Business at the Lessius University College, Antwerp, Belgium. He holds a BA and MA in Economics (UFSIA), and an MBA from the University of Antwerp Management School (UAMS). He got his PhD from the University of Antwerp on Belgian subsidiary management in the People's Republic of China: Strategic evolution, host country impact and policy. Dr. De Beule has lectured as Visiting Professor at the University of Antwerp and the Catholic University of Leuven, where he teaches courses on the economics and economic development of China. Mr. De Beule is member of the Academy of International Business and the European International Business Academy (EIBA). He serves on the board of EIBA as national representative for Belgium. He is an affiliate researcher at the LICOS Centre for Institutions and Economic Performance at the Catholic University of Leuven, where he focuses his research on multinational companies and emerging economies.

Prof. Dr. Ching Lin Pang



Ching Lin Pang (°1963) is Professor at the research unit IMMRC (Interculturalism, Migration and Minorities Research Centre), Social Sciences KU Leuven. She obtained a MA in Oriental Philology (Leuven, 1984), a MA in Asian Studies (Berkeley, 1985), a MA in Social and Cultural Anthropology (Leuven, 1993) and a Ph.D. in Social and Cultural Anthropology (Leuven, 1996). She teaches on interculturalism, culture and economics, commodification of cultural diversity, anthropology of business, migrants and spatial transformation in the urban setting. Her research relates, on the one hand on the anthropology of identity and migration processes (new migrant groups and their identity, transnational social network including human smuggling and trafficking, migration and integration policy) and, on the other hand on, cultural globalisation in the urban setting: transnational entrepreneurship, development of ethnic precincts such as Chinatowns in European countries. Her primary focus is on the Chinese, Japanese and in second instance the Indians in the Belgian/European setting, with attention to main trends in the countries of origin.

Prof. Dr. Cedric Ryngaert



Cedric Ryngaert (° 1978, Kortrijk, Belgium) is lecturer in international law at K.U. Leuven. He studied law at K.U. Leuven and he obtained his PhD in international law at Leuven University. Since 2008 he has been appointed as lecturer at KU Leuven. His main research interests are jurisdiction and immunities, international organizations, international criminal justice, non-state actors, and international human rights. Cedric Ryngaert is also lecturer in international law at Utrecht University (Netherlands) and rapporteur of the International Law Association's Committee on non-State Actors. Prof. Dr. Stephan Keukeleire



Stephan Keukeleire (1962, Brugge) is Jean Monnet Professor in European Foreign Policy at K.U. Leuven. He studied Politics at the K.U.Leuven and European Studies at the University of Hull (U.K.) and University of Strasbourg (France) and he obtained his PhD in Political Science at the K.U.Leuven. Since 2006 he has been appointed as a professor at KU Leuven. His main research interests are foreign policy analysis and European foreign policy. Professor Keukeleire is also director of the “Master of European Studies – Transnational and Global Perspectives” and vice-director of the “Master in European Politics and Policies” at the K.U.Leuven, coordinator of the Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence ‘The EU, Foreign Policy and Global Governance’, member of the board of the LCGGS, and Visiting Professor at the College of Europe in Bruges.
